1. What is this study about?

We are conducting a research study about how Year 12 students view the Higher School Certificate (HSC) and its dual purposes as both a qualification for finishing school and a pathway to university. We aim to find out if students have misconceptions about these purposes, whether these misconceptions contribute to stress, and what changes to the system students would prefer. This research is important because it highlights student perspectives and explores ways to reduce stress, improve the HSC experience, and ensure the system better supports students' needs and goals. Taking part in this study is voluntary.

Please read this sheet carefully and ask questions about anything you don't understand or want to know more about.

2. Who is running this study?

The study is being carried out by the following researchers:

Jim Tognolini- Professor and Director of the Centre for Educational Measurement and Assessment (CEMA) at the University of Sydney

Bianca Aiello- Conducting this study as a basis for Honours in Education at the University of Sydney.

3. Who can take part in the study?

We are seeking both ATAR and non-ATAR Year 12 students and students who graduated Year 12 in 2024. This is because these students are uniquely positioned to provide firsthand insights into the challenges and stressors of completing the HSC. Moreover, graduate students' perspectives may alter upon completion of the HSC.

4. What will the study involve for me?

If you decide to take part in this study, you will be asked to participate in a 30-minute interview on your school or university campus. If you are not affiliated with a school or university, interviews will be conducted in public library seminar rooms.

You will be asked these main questions, as well as potential follow up questions:

1. Were/are you eligible for an ATAR?
 - What influenced your decision to choose this?
2. Do you currently think the HSC serves more than one purpose? Why/why not?
 - If yes, what are the purposes?
 - If no, what is the one purpose?
 - (if relevant to participant) Prior to receiving your results from UAC and NESA, did your opinion differ to what you believe now? Why/why not?
3. On a scale from 1 to 5, with 5 being highly stressed and 1 being not at all, how stressed did/do you feel in the HSC?
 - Why did/do you feel this stressed and why did you choose this number?
4. Are the factors contributing to your stress predominantly external or internal factors? Why/why not?
5. What is your attitude towards the current HSC system?
6. What do you believe the best HSC system would be and why?

You don't have to answer all of them, and you can go into as much or as little depth as you are comfortable with. You may also be asked follow up questions based on your responses given the interview structure will not be rigid and can flow naturally.

There will be audio recording on a phone involved if you consent to this. This will help the researcher transcribe your responses for analysis purposes later in the research project. There will also be an opportunity for you to review this transcript prior to analysis so you can verify the transcript accurately reflects your contributions. The researcher will contact you when you need to engage in this process. You will be provided with approximate dates of when it will occur after your interview.

5. Can I withdraw once I have started?

Being in this study is completely voluntary and you do not have to take part. If you are under the age of 18, we will also ask your parent/carer/guardian if they are happy for you to be part of this study, but even if they say yes, you can still choose to say no.

Your decision will not affect your current or future relationship with the researchers or anyone else at The University of Sydney.

If you decide to take part in the study and then change your mind, you can withdraw by telling the interviewer (who is the researcher) at any time during or before the interview.

In the interview you may refuse to answer any questions that you do not wish to answer.

If you choose to withdraw, we will stop collecting information from you. If you don't want the information already collected to be in the study results, please tell us at the time you withdraw.

6. Are there any risks or costs?

Given we aim to ask about your experiences of stress, this may raise sensitive issues such as mental health. As a reminder, you do not have to answer questions if you feel uncomfortable. Options to withdraw will also be provided at the start of the interview and, if necessary, in the interview.

7. Are there any benefits?

You will not receive any direct benefits from being in the study.

However, the study aims to benefit the wider community by providing insights into how the HSC system affects students' well-being and academic experiences. By identifying stressors and potential misconceptions, the research may inform improvements to the HSC, promoting a more supportive educational environment. These findings could potentially guide policymakers and educators in creating a system that better aligns with student needs, ultimately fostering healthier and more equitable outcomes for future Year 12 students.

8. What will happen to information that is collected?

By providing your consent, you are agreeing to us collecting information from you for the purposes of this study. The information collected will include interview data based on your responses. Specifically, the interview data will be audio recorded on a phone if you consent to this so the researcher can transcribe and analyse your responses. There will also be an opportunity for you to review this transcript prior to analysis so you can verify the transcript accurately reflects your contributions. We will use Microsoft Stream to transcribe interviews. This will involve sharing your information with Microsoft. We will not share this information with anyone else without your consent unless we are required to do so by law. Microsoft Stream is owned by Microsoft and located in Redmond, Washington, US.

Any other identifiable information you provide us will be stored securely and will only be disclosed with your permission unless we are required by law to release information. Therefore, no third parties will have access to your information during or after the study unless it is enforced.

Whilst we plan to publish the findings, you will not be individually identifiable in these publications.

We will store all this information securely following the University's Recordkeeping Policy. Only Bianca Aiello (Honours student) and Jim Tognolini (Responsible researcher) will have access to the data during or after the study. The data collected will be retained for a minimum of five years after the completion of analysis and publication. After this period the data can be disposed of securely.
